The Rosie Project by Graeme Simsion (01/24/20)

Don Tillman, a professor of genetics, sets up a project designed to find him the perfect wife. Then he meets Rosie, who is everything he's not looking for in a wife, but she ends up his triend as he helps her try and find her biological father.



The Patron Saint of Liars by Ann Patchett (2/28/20)



St. Elizabeth's, a home for unwed mothers, usually harbors its residents for only a little while. Rose Clinton comes to the home pregnant but not unwed and plans to give up her child. When Cecilia is born, Rose keeps her but the past will catch up.

*Alternate Side by Anna Quindlen (3/13/20)

Some days Nora Nolan thinks she and her husband, Charlie, lead a charmed life. Then one morning a terrible incident shakes her neighborhood, and the fault lines begin to open: on the block, at her job, especially in her marriage.



*Stars are Fire by Anita Shreve (4/24/20)



Based on the true story of the largest fire in Maine's history In October 1947. Fires break out all along the Maine coast and are soon racing out of control. Five months pregnant, Grace Holland is left alone to protect her two toddlers. Grace's bravery is tested as never before.
