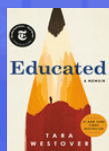

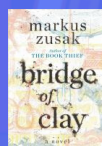
Educated by Tara Westover

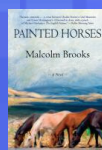
Silent Sister by Diane Chamberlain

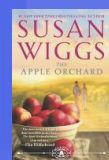
Bridge of Clay by Markus Zusak
