


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BOOK CLUB SELECTIONS FOR 2021



The Hideaway by Lauren Denton (January)



After Sara's last remaining family member dies, she goes home to The Hideaway, her grandmother Maa's ramshackle B & B in Sweet Bay, Alabama. She learns it has been willed to her and in charge of renovations-no small task considering Mags's best friends, a motley crew of senior citizens, still live there.

Before We Were Yours by Lisa Wingate (February)



Memphis Tennessee, 1939- The five Foss children find their lives changed forever when they are wrenched from their home and thrown into the care of the infamous Georgia Tann, director of the Tennessee Children's Home Society. Years later a chance encounter with a stranger leads to a journey through a family's longhidden history.

Little Fire Everywhere by Celeste Ng (March)



The intertwined fates of the picture-perfect Richardson family and the enigmatic mother and daughter who upend their lives. Explore the weight of secrets, the nature of art and identity and the ferocious pull of motherhood.

Lying Game by Ruth Ware (April)





Us Against You by Fredrik Backman (June)



The citizens of Beartown are struck yet another blow when their beloved local hockey team is disbanded. A new team starts to take shape but a bitter rivalry will leave someone dead, and others left to wonder if the game they love can ever return to something simple and innocent.

Bride Test by Helen Hoang (July)



Khai Diep has no feelings. He thinks he's defective. His family knows better—that his autism means he just processes emotions differently. When his mother takes matters into her own hands to find him a bride, Khai is forced to understand there's more than one way to love.

Just Mercy by Bryan Stevenson (August)



Bryan Stevenson was a young lawyer when he founded the Equal Justice Just Initiative, a nonprofit law office dedicated to defending the poor, the incarcerated, and the wrongly condemned. An unforgettable true story about the potential for mercy to rédeem us, and a clarion call to end mass incarceration in America.

Less by Andrew Sean Greer (September)



Arthur Less is a failed novelist, about to turn 50 and just got invited to his ex's wedding. Thus begins an around-the-world trip that will take Arthur to Mexico, Italy, Germany, Morocco, India and Japan and put thousands of miles between him and the problems he refuses to face. City of Girls by Elizabeth Gilbert (October)




